



Recipes to for your Saint Patty's Day

Irish Soda Bread

Recipe by Kara Zauberman

Ingredients

2 1/2 c. all-purpose flour

1 c. cake flour (or substitute 1 cup all-purpose flour plus 2 tablespoons cornstarch)

1/4 c. sugar

1 tsp. baking soda

1 tsp.salt

1 stick cold salted butter, cut into pieces

1 large egg

1 1/2 c. buttermilk

1/2 c. golden raisins

1/2 c. dried cranberries



Step 1: Preheat the oven to 375. In the bowl of a mixer, combine the flour, sugar, baking soda, and salt. Using your fingers, work 4 tablespoons cold butter into the flour until the butter is in small bits.

Step 2: In a separate small bowl, whisk the egg into the buttermilk and pour into the flour mixture. Using the paddle attachment, mix on low speed for a few turns, until the dough is barely incorporated; there will still be some dry flour in the bowl. Add the raisins and cranberries and bring the dough together with your hands, kneading until the dough comes together and there aren't any dry bits of flour left.

Step 3: Form the dough into a round and place in a medium-size cast-iron pan. With a sharp knife, cut a large X on the top of the dough (this will help it bake through). Bake for 50 to 55 minutes, until the top is golden brown and the bread sounds hollow when you tap on it.

Step 4: Melt the remaining 4 tablespoons butter. Remove the pan from the oven and brush the top of the bread with the melted butter.

Womens Progressive Movement & Spiritualism

Spiritualism was a religious and cultural movement that many suffragists and women's rights advocates were drawn to because of its emphasis on equality and its rejection of traditional religious hierarchies. The word "progress" for Spiritualists has two meanings, one that means spiritual advancement and the other with the individual as they become more attuned with the spiritual world or develop greater awareness of spiritual matters through mediumship and healing.



The magnetic attraction of progressives to Spiritualism, and, inversely, Spiritualists to progressivism derived its source from the religion's intrinsic rebellion: through its inception in Hydesville a rebellion against oppression, through its ideology a rebellion against convention, and through the séance a rebellion against death itself.

The Progressive movement that started in the later 1880s and would fully develop after WWI, was filled with Spiritualists leaders who wanted to spiritually progress people to have a more inclusive, equal and diverse society. The Philadelphia Progressive Women's Club was a women's organization founded in 1912 in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, with the goal of promoting social and political reform. The club was primarily made up of middle-class and upperclass white women, but they also actively sought to include African American women in their activities. The club was known for its involvement in a variety of social and political causes, including women's suffrage, education, and labor rights. They also had an interest in spiritualism, which was a popular movement in the late 19th and early 20th

In the case of African Americans and spiritualism, the Philadelphia Progressive Women's Club was one of several organizations that supported the creation of a Spiritualist church for African Americans in Philadelphia. With the first established Spiritualist church being in Philadelphia in 1852, with prominent social justice speakers such as Harriet Tubman,

centuries that claimed to communicate with the dead and the spirit world.

Sojourner Truth and Frederick Douglass, Philadelphia will become a cornerstone for Spiritualism's activism.

African American women were

also an integral part of the progressive, suffrage and women's rights movements, although they often faced discrimination and exclusion from mainstream organizations, they found a voice in Spiritualism. Women such as Sojourner Truth, Harriet Wilson, and Dr. Gertrude Curtis (the first African American Female Dentist) were prominent voices for suffrage and women's rights, and they often connected their struggle for equal rights with the broader struggle for racial justice.

One example of the intersection of spiritualism and African American suffrage activism can be seen in the life of Harriet Tubman. Tubman was a former slave who became a leading abolitionist and suffragist, and she also had a deep connection to spiritualism. Tubman believed that she received messag-

es and guidance from God through visions and dreams, and she often attributed her success in the Underground Railroad to her spiritual connection. Later Tubman would take the platform at Spiritualist gatherings such as the First Association of Spiritualists of Philadelphia to speak about equality and the right to vote.

Another example of the connection between spiritualism and women's rights can be seen in the work of feminist and spiritualist Victoria Woodhull. Woodhull was the first woman to run for president in the United States in 1872, and she also founded the first women-owned brokerage firm on Wall Street. Woodhull was a vocal advocate for women's suffrage and sexual liberation, and she also believed in the importance of spiritualism and the ability to communicate with the spirit world.

Overall, the suffrage and women's rights movements were deeply influenced by the ideas and beliefs of Spiritualism, and African American women played a crucial role in advocating for women's rights and connecting their struggle with the broader struggle for racial justice.

Lucille Clifton – Moved by Spirit to write (1936-2010)

Lucille Clifton (1936-2010) was an American poet, educator, and author who is best known for her powerful and deeply personal poetry. Born in Depew, New York, Clifton grew up in Buffalo, where she attended Fosdick-Masten Park High School before studying at Howard University in Washington, D.C and then returning to the Buffalo area to attend SUNY-Fredonia. She lived near Lilydale, Rochester and the birthplace of Spiritualism, at Hydesville, New York. Due to her upbringing and location, Clifton was aware of Spiritualism.

Clifton's contributions to literature and her spiritual themed writings have been recognized with numerous awards and honors, including the National Book Award, the Ruth Lilly Poetry Prize, and the Robert Frost Medal. In addition to her poetry, Clifton was a highly regarded educator and taught at several universities, including Coppin State College, the University of California at Santa Cruz, and St. Mary's College of Maryland.





Throughout her career, Clifton was known for her exploration of matters related to African American identity, family, and spirituality. She was deeply interested in the subject of spiritualism and believed in communication between the living and the dead. Clifton's interest in spiritualism is reflected in her "spirit writings," a collection of notes and messages that she believed were communicated to her by spirits through automatic writing, channeling and mediumship.

She often referred to herself as a "Two-Headed Woman", a term carried over from Africa and used throughout the South to describe a woman with the gift of sight (mediumship and prophecy). During her time in Baltimore, Clifton would open up her home to offer spirit communication and discussions.

to explore issues related to race, gender, and identity. By 1979, her mediumship will transform to channeling and prophetic writings. By 1980s, her channeling showcased interviews with a collective group of spirits she referred to as "the Ones" who gave her prophetic warnings of things to come. According to Dr. Marina Magloire (2015), an Emory University professor: "Clifton's spirit communications foreshadow contemporary global issues like climate change and the rise of the far right, and they position Black women at the vanguard of addressing these issues," They came back "to remind human beings that they are more than flesh."

One example of this is her poem "My Mama Moved among the days," which reflects on the idea of spiritual transformation:



My Mama moved among the days like a dreamwalker in a field; seemed like what she touched was hers seemed like what touched her couldn't hold, she got us almost through the high grass then seemed like she turned around and ran right back in right back on in

Lucille Clifton's spirit writings are available online through Emory University's Manuscript, Archives, and Rare Book Library. The collection includes a notebook in which Clifton recorded her experiences with spiritualism, including messages that she believed were communicated to her by spirits. Lucille Clifton would transition in 2010, leaving behind a legacy of powerful and deeply personal poetry and spirit writings that continues to resonate with readers today. Clifton's work can be read along with 300 more female poets at Marilyn Sewell's book: Cries of

Church of Peace: Psychical Research Science Society









Declarations of Principles

- 1. We believe in Infinite Intelligence.
